CHOOSE YOUR DEGREE

MASTERS OR PHD

- > Your degree should be driven by the following: what is your ultimate goal for a career?
 - Look at what is necessary for that degree and start there! Certain disciplines only require a masters (e.g., MBA for business, MSW for social work) while others don't get you very far with only a masters (e.g., psychology).
 - Masters degrees can be expensive (~65,000 per year) but take less time to complete
 - > PhD programs PAY YOU but take a long time to complete (5-7 years depending on discipline)

THE PROCESS

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- Due dates begin around 11/15 and go through the end of the calendar year (for PhD programs)
- Invitations are extended in December (generally)
- Interviews take place in January & February
 - Virtual and in-person
- Offers extended usually within a few weeks after interviews are over
- If you didn't receive an initial offer, don't fret! You may be on a waitlist



THE PERSONAL STATEMENT (AKA STATEMENT OF PURPOSE)

WHAT IS A PERSONAL STATEMENT?

- A narrative of your experiences and how they have shaped your interest in a particular topic
- Your personal statement should be in line with the topic of your potential advisor but not be EXACTLY the same (they don't want a mini-me)
- What did you do, what did you learn, how did it change how you thought about a particular topic/ idea
 - Be specific here.



WHAT IS A PERSONAL STATEMENT?

I ran an experimental study that sought to understand how rejection clarity (ambiguous vs. explicit) and group membership (ingroup vs. outgroup) impacted rumination, negative affect, and risk-taking in Black and White identified individuals. I hypothesized that...For this study, participants (N=200) completed the Cyberball task where they believe they were being rejected (with certainty or ambiguously) by either a person of the same race or of a different race. Participants completed the Columbia Card Task after the interaction along with measures of affect and rumination. I ran a series of ANOVAs and found that...This went against previous literature in the field and suggests that...The result of this study were presented at the 2024 conference for..."

WHAT IS A PERSONAL STATEMENT?

- > Should weave your story and insight about a topic together while also demonstrating your skillset (e.g., data analysis, presentation skills, research design, manuscript preparation, etc.)
- Your personal statement should be in line with the topic of your potential advisor but not be EXACTLY the same (they don't want a mini-me)
- It's not your CV in written form!
 - Not every experience needs to go in your statement. Talk about the things most pertinent to your potential area of study

LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

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Who should write them?

- People that you think will be able to write positively about your character, insight, critical thinking ability, scholarly experience
- Sood people are: faculty with whom you've done research or interned with in a clinical setting; Your boss (if working with them in a research capacity)
- Less ideal people are: faculty of a class you've taken once (unless you've interacted with them sufficiently and believe they know you quite well)
- > Try to get a mix of faculty who can speak to different parts of your work
 - Lab PI, SURG advisor, honors thesis advisor, clinical research supervisor

> Program structure


- Course:research ratio (PhD programs emphasize research!)
- > Type of training (kinds of courses, certificates?)

Compensation


- Amount (consider location and QoL)
- Dependent on TA/RA-ship?

Location

Remember you want a life OUTSIDE of your grad program



THINGS TO CONSIDER (CLINICAL TRAINING)...



> An accredited school

- Should be APA accredited for psychology programs
- % of people who match on internship
 - Clinical programs ALSO require a one-year internship at a different institution after courses are done before you can graduate
 - "Matching" is based (in part) on clinical training

WHAT TO CONSIDER IN AN ADVISOR

And what should really drive when choosing a program

- Research fit close but not always complete overlap
- Tenure status Assistant versus Associate/Full
- Mentoring style Hands on or hands off?
- Collaboration Open to it or not? How important is this for you?
- Advising experience Where did their prior grad students go afterwards?
- **Vibes -** Do you get a good feeling about them?

THIS IS GREAT AND ALL, BUT WHEN DO I NEED TO START PREPARING?!

WHEN TO START THIS PROCESS

- > Programs/Advisors summer before applications are due!!
 - Reach out to potential advisors over summer to see if they're taking students
- Personal Statement/SOP start a draft during summer and get feedback early fall
- Letters of recommendation Early Fall semester (or as soon as you know)
 - You'll also likely get better letters when you give your letter writers more time
- ▶ GREs Take them end of summer so you have enough time to retake them before due dates if necessary
 - Subject specific exams are only offered certain times of the year (e.g., clinical psych)
